### 1787 Constitutional Convention

#### Weaknesses of the AOC

- Allowed for "unbridled republicanism" (i.e., a system where an elected group of reps is beholden to the will of the people) → greed and self-interest
- Conservatives want to safeguard wealth, position, property
- No economic regulation= some states in bad economic shape (though by 1786 most of this had been fixed)

## 1787 Philadelphia Convention

- 55 delegates from 12 states (all but RI) meet to revise AOC
- Decide to scrap the AOC rather than revise
- Issues: balance power between large and small states, executive power, slavery, safeguarding against a too powerful government

#### Feds vs. Anti-feds

- Federalists: in favor of the Constitution, tended to be wealthy, live in cities, more educated. Washington, Hamilton, Madison, Jay, Franklin
- Anti-federalists: thought Constitution protected the wealthy, ignored states' rights, tended to be poorer, live in the backcountry, farmers, demanded a bill of rights. Samuel Adams, Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson.

# Federalist Papers

- arguing for the ratification of the Constitution. The essays led to New York approving the new government, making it official in 1788.
- Federalist #10 argues for a representative democracy to protect against a "tyranny of the majority".
  Madison argued that educated representatives would vote for the good of the whole country.
- Federalist #51 argued for three separate branches of government with checks and balances, to prevent a monarchy from occurring again.
- Federalist #78 argued for an independent judiciary, appointed for life, with the power of judicial review

- What is the purpose of government?
